

Having pursued a career as a leader and drawing on his own professional experience, Michel Peya has written this book inspired by his observations of a termite mound, from which he has extracted a myth about the choice between common sense and absolute power changeover. According to him, anyone who has ever observed a queen termite being dislodged from her nest ("mbolomboro" in Mbosi) is certain of just one thing: the termite mound will disintegrate. This social disintegration becomes apparent gradually, beginning with the departure of the termite mound's guard (from the soldiers to the officers), which consists of battalions and regiments of termites. Snakes, rats, centipedes and crocodiles become the new occupants. Chaos reigns.

In essence, this is what has happened on the human scale in most countries when a charismatic leader is brutally removed from power (in the name of absolute power change). Libya, Iraq, the DRC, Egypt, Congo-Brazzaville... all are powerful examples of this plight.

The choice of the intelligent economic-political agent is oriented towards good "common sense" democracy, i.e., African-style democracy, known as "Osambe" in the Mbosi language. Its degree of higher intelligence proves that Western-style democracy, known as "mara'ombori" in Mbosi, is poorly suited to Africa.
